Course Fees

Continuing Education course fees vary as outlined in course descriptions. Regardless of base cost, non-residents must add \$10 per course. Payment—in the form of a check or money order—must be submitted at the time of registration. Each registration must be for ONE course for ONE person with ONE check for that specific course. PLEASE DO NOT SEND CASH.

In certain courses a limited number of free registrations will be made available to senior citizens who have a Bethlehem Central Senior Citizens Pass (available at the high school main office, 700 Delaware Ave, Delmar). This does not apply to HILL classes. Seniors must include a copy of their senior citizens pass with their registration form to receive the exemption. One exemption per semester, per person is allowed. Classes must have sufficient paid registrations for senior exemptions to be granted.

Fees for materials and supplies should not be included with the course fee when you register but should be paid to the instructor when class meets.

Eligibility

Courses are open to all persons ages 16 or over in the Capital District. For courses accommodating a limited number of students, Bethlehem Central residents will have preference.

Registration

With the exception of the "Five-Hour Driver Prelicense" course, registration must be made in advance.

To register:

- **Mail your registration before February 7 or**
- **Drop off your registration at the High School main office by February 7, 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.**
- **Registration received after February 7 will not be accepted.**

For both methods, please use the registration form provided (on the back page of this brochure). The registration form is also available on the district website (<http://bethlehemschools.org>).

Please use separate checks for each class. Your check will not be deposited until classes start.

You will NOT receive confirmation of registration. You will be notified only if the class is cancelled or if class limits have been exceeded. In both cases, your check will be returned.

Class Times/Locations

Most Continuing Education courses meet once a week, between 6 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., and last up to ten weeks. Exceptions are noted within course descriptions. Please check the schedule of the class(es) in which you are interested.

Most classes are held at Bethlehem High School, 700 Delaware Ave. in Delmar, but classes are held in other district buildings. Note class locations in the course descriptions.

Refunds

Refunds will be given if withdrawal from a class occurs before the start of the first class. Refunds will not be given for missed class sessions.

Cancellations and Rescheduled Classes

The Continuing Education Office may cancel courses with fewer than 12 registrants, since those courses may not meet expenses. In addition, we reserve the right to cancel/reschedule classes due to unforeseen situations.

The Music of Richard Strauss

Starts: March 6
Time: 10:00-12:00 noon
Place: Delmar Reformed Church

INSTRUCTOR: Josef Schmee, Kenneth B. Sharpe
Professor, Emeritus, of Management, Union College

Richard Strauss was the scion of a famed horn player father and a Munich beer brewing mother. Influenced by Liszt and Wagner, he quickly established his own compositional language and style. His earlier major works are tone poems, such as *Thus Spake Zarathustra* and *Heldenleben*, composed before the turn of the century. He created exceptional operas, such as *Salome* and *Rosenkavalier*, in the early decades of the 20th century. The political turmoil of the Nazi era led to several important compositions of his late style, such as *Metamorphosen* for Strings and "Vier Letzte Lieder." His late style operas include *Daphne*, *Capriccio*, and *The Love of Danae*. Throughout his life, Strauss composed lieder, German songs based on texts by the great poets. We will sample

1917 in 2017: World War I & The Shaping of the Modern World

Starts: March 6

INSTRUCTOR: Robert Fogarty, Associate Professor of History, SUNY, Albany

Americans entered the First World War, or the Great War as contemporaries knew it, exactly 100 years ago this spring. That entry, and the war in general, has profoundly shaped the modern world down to the present day. Without doubt, the legacy of this war will continue to shape our future. This course will explore how an understanding of the events of a century ago can help us to understand our present and future—how 1917 has led to 2017. Each of 6 sessions will examine one topic, either a region or nations such as Europe, the Middle East, Russia, the United States, etc., or a topic such as technology, religion, empire, the international order, or culture, and politics and explain how each was impacted by the war.

Big Trials in American History

INSTRUCTOR: Richard Hamm, Professor of History & Collins Fellow, SUNY, Albany

From the colonial period through today, the American legal system has produced notable trials which tell us much about American society. This course will sweep through American history and will describe and analyze a number of different trials, some less well known than others, to help us understand major and contentious issues that have confronted Americans in the past. Trials to be covered include: the Salem witch trials, the child custody dispute over Frederick D'Hauteville, the trial of the Reverend Avery for the murder of a "mill girl," the trial of the slave Celia for the murder of her master, the trial of Harry Thaw for the murder of Stanford White, and the trial of Leo Frank for the killing of Mary Phagan.

French Art from Absolutism to Impressionism

INSTRUCTOR: **Sarah Cohen**, Professor of Art History & Women's Studies, SUNY Albany

This course presents art of all mediums produced in France from the consolidation of the country under the Valois and Bourbon kings of the Renaissance and Baroque eras, through the origins of Modernism in the 19th century art and culture. The course will culminate with an examination of the French Impressionists and the many ways in which their radical new painting styles intersected with French social life and the central concerns of their era.

Apocalypse Soon! Studies on Views, Claims, and Fears About the "End of the World As We Know It"

Time: 1:30-3:30 p.m.

INSTRUCTOR: **Peter Bedford**, John & Jane Wold Professor of Religious Studies & Director of Program in Religious Studies, Union College

The band REM once sang "It's the end of the world as we know it...and I feel fine!" Most people who claim to know that the end of the world is coming don't want you to feel fine. They want you to follow their instructions and join their movement to prepare for the event. In this course we will examine cases where certain groups have warned of imminent catastrophe facing society and even the

earth itself. How do they know anything about the coming catastrophe? What has happened to precipitate our demise, and why such a negative assessment of humanity and its prospects? How is religion involved, if at all? What, if anything, can be done to forestall or change this fate? These are some of the questions we will address as we draw on examples from the ancient, medieval and modern periods, making use of historical and sociological perspectives to explore what gives rise to the view that "the end is nigh."

Oil Painting

Learn colors and how to see them. Paint from setups and photos. Bring rags, turpentine, paint, brushes, canvas, or canvas board, and sketchpad. If you're not sure what brushes, colors, etc. to bring, this information will be covered in the first class. If selecting supplies before the first class, try water oils. They work the same as oils only are not as toxic, and are easier to clean up. Wear old clothes and a smile. Previous students are more than welcome. Limit of 20 students. No class on April 18.

Pastel Painting

This is an introductory course in the technique of Pastel. Finished works will range from a simple colored sketch to a robust finished work comparable to an oil painting. Classes will consist of a brief talk about technique and demonstration followed by a painting session. Mixing and layering colors, working on a variety of textural surfaces and basic color theory will be discussed. Artists with more advanced skills are encouraged to work independently. Imagine yourself as a child drawing with a new box of crayons- the more colors the better. We will use soft, not oil pastels. A materials list will be handed out the first night of class. Limit of 20 students. No class on April 20.

SAT Review: Critical Reading & Writing Subtests

This course will prepare students to take the Verbal section of the SAT offered in the spring of 2017. The new test design places emphasis on text-based answers for all passages including scientific, historical and literature passages. In preparation for the Reading Test, students will be guided through the following: 1) an overview of the types of passages to expect, as well as tips for encountering each type 2) how to enhance the skills required to answer the “command of evidence” questions 3) vocabulary in context strategies, per the new test design. In preparation for the Writing and Language Test, students will be guided through the following:

1) an overview of the commonly tested standard English conventions, including tips and tricks 2) a de-emphasis on memorization, with an emphasis on skill based test taking strategies 3) easy to remember punctuation rules. Although the essay is not required, students’ writing skills will shine after being guided through: 1) a guided practice on how to read and analyze several passages with a heavy emphasis on analysis 2) an overview of rhetorical strategies including ethos, pathos, logos, rhetorical questions, and more! 3) suggestions for cohesive, inclusive essay structure.

For the first class, students must have *Cracking the New SAT with 4 Practice Tests, 2016 Edition: Created for the Redesigned 2016 Exam*, published by Princeton Review. Limit of 25 students.
