Delivering top-quality education with a budget focused on student success

On Tuesday, May 20, residents will consider a \$116.6 million budget for the 2025-26 school year. The budget would maintain high-quality instruction, small class sizes and support for students in all grades.

The proposed 2025-26 budget includes a tax levy increase of \$820,000, or 1.12%. The budget totals \$116,623,936, a 2.27% increase compared to the current budget. Both the tax levy increase and overall budget increase are BELOW the annual rate of inflation. The plan proposes the use of \$715,241 in fund balance to keep the tax levy increase within New York State's required tax cap formula.

The budget balances student needs against a backdrop of economic uncertainty. The year-to-year budget increase is mainly due to the rising costs of healthcare (medical and pharmaceutical) and retirement benefits. These contractual and mandated expenses are set to increase by \$1,893,736, or 6.5%, next year. Over the last two years, health and retirement costs in the district have increased by \$4,578,239, or 17.4%. Salary costs, which are subject to contractual agreements, are expected to increase by 2.8% in the new school year.

"Education is a people business. The reason BC is continually ranked as one of the best districts in New York State is because of its people," said Superintendent Jody Monroe. "When you are asked to invest in schools, you are investing in those individuals who support students every day: teachers, principals, bus drivers, food service workers, grounds and maintenance employees, counselors, and coaches."

The proposed budget continues current academic programs, services, and student opportunities in music, art, and athletics. The budget maintains the smaller class sizes that have been in place since the pandemic. For grades K-5, the budget includes a new English Language Arts program known as Bookworms to increase reading comprehension and writing skills.



2025-26 budget questions and answers

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Α.

What will the impact of the budget be on my 2025-26 tax bill?

The 2025-26 school tax rate for residents of the town of Bethlehem is estimated to increase by 1.35%, or \$30 more per \$100,000 of assessed value. In the town of New Scotland, the school tax rate is estimated to decrease by 1.64%, or approximately \$37 less per \$100,000 of assessed value in 2025-26. The rates fluctuate from year to year and from municipality to municipality. These fluctuations are driven by the total tax levy, the total assessed value of property in each community and the equalization rates set by the state of New York. Final tax rates are determined each year in August, after tax rolls are finalized and before tax bills are issued.

0. How does enrollment factor into district decision-making?

The proposed budget continues all academic programs and opportunities for students and maintains smaller class sizes. Enrollment impacts annual decisions on staffing. Compared to its 2006-07 peak, district enrollment has declined by 21.3%. To address enrollment declines, the district has reduced staff incrementally through attrition (when positions become vacant, they are not filled if not necessary to meet student needs). The proposed 2025-26 budget eliminates several staff positions (7.5 FTE instructional positions and 11 full- and part-time support positions). These are reductions of positions, not people; they affect only vacant positions or those that will be eliminated after an individual retires. These staff reductions will not impact students. Enrollment is influenced by birth rates, societal trends, economic conditions, and housing markets. Enrollment is expected to decline by 1.8%, a net decline of 67 students in 2025-26. The decline at the K-5 level is anticipated to be 4.6%, or 81 fewer students. Enrollment in grades 6-8 is expected to increase by 24 students, or 2.6%. BCHS enrollment is expected to decline by 10 students, or less than 1%. New housing developments could lead to enrollment growth over the next several years. Administrators are working with local officials to assess the impact of housing growth on the schools.

ON THE BALLOT TWO PROPOSITIONS

BUS PURCHASE PROPOSITION

A school bus purchase proposition will be on the ballot on May 20. The bus proposition would allow the district to replace aging school buses. The plan is to purchase six vehicles, including three large 70-passenger diesel buses and three small 24-passenger gas-powered buses for student transportation, at a cost not to exceed \$814,770. Approximately 66% of the borrowing cost for the purchase is covered by state aid, resulting in a final maximum cost to the district of roughly \$277,022 for the six vehicles.

The district is not planning to add to its fleet of electric school buses in 2025-26 due to uncertainty surrounding the federal grant funding that has made EV bus purchases affordable. The district is continuing its commitment to cleaner energy transportation and is planning to invest \$22,750 as part of the budget to purchase EV charge management software to maximize the efficiency of BC's EV buses.

2025 CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

A separate proposition will appear on the ballot seeking to establish a 2025 Capital Reserve Fund up to \$30 million. Reserve funds are separate accounts set up to finance various district expenses and serve as voter-approved savings accounts that are used for specific purposes.

A capital reserve fund allows the district to set aside money for future construction projects and major building repairs, reducing the need for borrowing for facilities improvement projects. Only in years where a surplus exists can money be placed in the capital reserve.

Voter approval would also be required at the time capital reserve funds were to be spent. There is no tax increase associated with the creation of the reserve fund.

The proposed 2025-26 budget includes a \$100.000 capital outlay to expand installation of the Avigilon Door Status Monitoring System throughout the district. The door alarm system immediately alerts staff if an exterior door is propped open or is ajar during the school day. The alert system allows for a prompt response so the door can be closed and locked or repaired, if needed.

The monitoring system has been installed at the high school and at the middle school following voter approval during the last two budget cycles. The 2025-26 budget would expand the door alert system to the elementary schools, beginning with Hamagrael. The system is integrated with the Avigilon security camera and access control systems, which are used districtwide.

DISTRICT STRATEGIC PLAN FEATURES NEW DASHBOARD

In 2024-25, a committee of stakeholders reviewed the BCSD Strategic Plan, which was introduced in 2019. The plan has been extended with goals identified in the areas of Academics, Character, Community and Wellness. It has also been reinvigorated with a new online data dashboard to help district residents track progress toward meeting those goals.

Tax rates for 2025-26 are estimates only. Often the tax rates differ between towns because of equalization rates set by the New York State Office of Real Property Services. The equalization rate for the Town of Bethlehem is currently at 64% (down from 71%). The equalization rate for the Town of New Scotland is currently at 65% (down from 70%). The district sets final tax rates in August, after the towns finalize assessment figures and the state confirms equalization rates. The rates and estimated changes shown here DO NOT reflect any STAR or other tax exemptions that may reduce individuals' school tax bills.

WHAT'S NEW IN THE PROPOSED 2025-26 BUDGET

Classroom Instruction

• Budget includes staffing to maintain the smaller class sizes that have been in place since the pandemic (elementary K-5 classes average 19 students per section; classes in grades 6-12 average 21 students per section in core courses)

 To increase reading competency and writing skills, the plan implements the phonics-based Bookworms English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum in grades K-5

• To match projected enrollment for 2025-26, the budget reduces 7.5 full-time equivalent (FTE) instructional positions, and 11 fulland part-time support positions (These are reductions of positions, not people; they affect only vacant

positions or those that will be eliminated after an individual retires. The reductions through attrition will not impact students and will save more than \$1.3 million)

Student Support Services & Student Opportunities

• To support food services at the district's seven schools, the budget includes a general fund transfer to the program of \$210,000

• The plan allocates \$5,000 for the school gardens. BCHS now features a "kitchen garden" where hundreds of pounds of produce grown in the garden go directly to the cafeteria for use in meals

• Proposed budget provides funding (\$5,000) for arts and education to expand arts enrichment programs for students

• The plan includes \$2.850 for an ergometer and taping table to support health of student-athletes

BC students outperform thousands of competitors to earn top spots in Stock Market Game

At a time when most people are feeling jittery about their investment portfolios, two BCHS seniors have embraced market volatility and defied the odds as New York State's top finishers in the Spring 2025 Stock Market Game.

Veer Williams, 1st Place: A senior and president of the BCHS Stock Market Club, Williams rang up more investment earnings than any of the 4,537 teams and individuals competing across the state. The Stock Market Game challenges students to use their knowledge of the markets and current events to grow an

imaginary \$100,000 account over a ten-week period. Williams began with \$100,000 on January 21, 2025 and finished with \$138,575 on April 11, 2025.

Mahmud Zamamiri, 2nd Place: Zamamiri, a senior and vice president of the school's Stock Market Club, placed second in New York State, outperforming all competitors except Williams. Zamamiri had a \$100K portfolio that grew to \$128,228 during the same ten-week period. Both are students in teacher Jason Majewski's AP Economics class.

UPK lottery information for 2025-26 Universal Pre-K application window is open through Friday, May 23

The Bethlehem Central School District is planning to partner with two local organizations to provide a pre-kindergarten program in 2025-26 for up to 92 eligible four-year-olds at no cost to families. It will be the second year the district will contract with a community-based partner to offer an instructional program for four-year-olds. The program is funded with state aid for Universal Pre-K (UPK) and has no impact on the 2025-26 school district budget.

Seats in the UPK program will be filled through a lottery process. The exact number of openings and classrooms at each location — TSL Adventures and ChildTime, both in Delmar – will be determined as part of the application and lottery process. TSL, which has been serving 36 UPK students this year, has indicated it would be able to provide as many as 72 spots in the new school year. ChildTime has indicated it could provide up to 20 spots in 2025-26. Selection and placement of students for UPK will be random, as determined by the lottery. The application window opened on May 1 and will close on May 23. The lottery will be held on Friday, May 30. To be eligible for the lottery, a child must have been born between Dec. 2, 2020 and Dec. 1, 2021. Children who are not placed in the program initially will be placed on a waiting list, and families will be contacted if space becomes available throughout the year.
