Residents to vote on Districtwide Capital Project on Dec. 2

On Tuesday, Dec. 2, residents will vote on a proposed capital improvement project designed to enhance academics, wellness, safety, and infrastructure across all district schools. The proposal includes 137 project elements and is budget neutral, meaning there will be no additional tax impact for local residents.

The plan features extensive renovations of outdated elementary classrooms and a districtwide cooling project, adding air conditioning to identified "hot spots" in several schools and to large common spaces such as gyms, libraries, and cafeterias.

Other featured projects include renovation of the Elsmere Library Media Center (LMC), renovation of the Slingerlands Elementary School kitchen and cafeteria, improvements to the Hamagrael cafeteria and gymnasium and the school's main office, bathroom renovations at the

high school and renovation of the "pit" area of the middle school for use by Physical Education/athletics.

The school district maintains nearly 1,000,000 square feet of space across nine buildings. The project would address the long-term durability, safety, efficiency, and maintenance of the district's infrastructure.

Emergency alarm systems would be upgraded districtwide. These systems use flashing lights to provide clear, visual notifications for different types of emergencies, from fires to lockdowns. These are designed to be accessible to everyone, including those with hearing disabilities.

The new alarm systems, along with roofing, window and door replacements, paving projects, masonry repairs, boiler replacements, site drainage and other infrastructure maintenance, account for nearly half of the proposed 2025 Capital Project.





Project Scope by type

CLASSROOM RENOVATIONS (34.2% OF PROJECT) At the four elementary schools, a total of 45 classrooms would get new floors, ceilings, lighting, casework and finishes. At BCMS, the art classrooms would be renovated and a music room moved. At BCHS, an art classroom, a Family and Consumer Science (FACS) classroom and technology classrooms would be upgraded. Estimated cost (including upgrades to other student-use areas such as libraries, cafeterias and gyms) is \$19,989,050.

AIR CONDITIONING (17.4% OF PROJECT) Air conditioning would be added to classrooms that have been identified as "hot spots," where temperatures often exceed 80 degrees in May, June and September. Air conditioning would be added to all schools in common areas such as gyms and cafeterias. Estimated cost is \$10,213,392.

INFRASTRUCTURE & SAFETY (48.4% OF PROJECT) Roof replacements, window and door replacements, masonry repairs, plumbing, & electrical and ventilation infrastructure upgrades, and site drainage and paving projects are proposed throughout the district. Upgraded fire/emergency alarm systems would be added at all schools (except BCHS, which already has an upgraded alarm system). Estimated cost is \$28,343,312.



2025 Capital Project Q & A

Q What is a capital project?

Just like a home, school facilities need attention and upkeep to maintain a healthy, safe, and secure environment for teaching and learning. Multiply the daily wear and tear of 4,150 active students and 800 staff members in seven schools, and these maintenance costs easily rise above what the annual general operating budget can support. Capital improvement projects are a way for school districts to finance larger amounts of facilities work in a cost-efficient manner by accessing state building aid and using voter-approved capital reserves.

What is the cost of the 2025 Capital Project?

If approved, the cost of the project would not exceed \$60,000,000. Due to anticipated state building aid, advance planning and expiring debt, there would be no additional tax impact to local taxpayers. New York State Building Aid is expected to fund 71.8% of eligible project costs. In addition, the district plans to use voter-approved savings from previous years. The district has \$16.6 million in a Capital Reserve which would be used to offset project costs, saving local taxpayers money. Strategic timing of the project is also key, as the district will be nearing final payoff of debt from prior capital projects as new, comparable debt payments are added.

If the cost estimates are \$58,545,754 as noted above, why is it a \$60 million proposition?

Voters are being asked to approve a maximum amount not to exceed \$60,000,000. In New York State, school districts are generally required to use a "not to exceed" amount in their bond propositions presented to voters. The "not to exceed" language ensures transparency and provides taxpayers with a clear understanding of the maximum financial commitment the district is authorized to make for a specific capital project. A school district's bond proposition amount typically exceeds project cost estimates to account for potential contingencies and fluctuations in project costs. These fluctuations can be hard to predict and can be caused by inflation, tariffs, job market pressures, etc.

Why is the vote in December and not in May during the regular budget vote?

To minimize disruption, school construction projects usually begin in late spring, with the bulk of work being completed during the summer months. A December 2025 vote will allow the district to continue on a timeline in which construction would begin in spring of 2027. This timeframe allows for design work, State Education Department (SED) approvals and the bidding process. If a vote were delayed to May 2026, the timeline would be pushed back far enough that construction could not begin until spring 2028. A delay would also disrupt the timing of bond financing and state aid payments that, with a December 2025 vote, allows the project to be budget neutral.


Who will benefit from the capital project?

The proposed project will benefit students, staff and the community, with students experiencing the greatest impact. Modernizing classrooms and other learning spaces will enrich the educational experience while enhancing the overall value of district facilities. In addition, BCSD frequently opens its buildings to community members for a variety of purposes, from using athletic fields and gyms to attending events such as stage productions in our auditoriums (see p.5). Capital improvements can positively impact home values, too. The National Association of Realtors reports that nearly 30% of home buyers list "school quality" as a deciding factor in their home purchase.

Will students be displaced while classrooms are being renovated?

Most capital project work is scheduled during summer vacations, school breaks or is done as nighttime work in order to minimize disruption to the instructional day. Due to the extensive classroom renovation work that is necessary at the elementary level, some elementary students may be displaced during the classroom renovations at Elsmere, Glenmont, Hamagrael and Slingerlands. Relocation of students, either within a building or between buildings, will be kept to a minimum. Once started, the classroom renovation projects are expected to take between three to six consecutive months to complete. These renovations would not begin until spring 2027, at the earliest, and any plan for relocation of students would be developed with input from stakeholders.

Modernizing mid-century classrooms for the 2030s and beyond

Classroom renovations are top priorities in the proposed capital project. More than 50 classrooms across the district would receive significant upgrades. Other areas, including libraries and cafeterias in older buildings, are scheduled for updates in the proposed capital project:

- Elsmere Elementary School (Built 1927) 13 classrooms, Library Media Center (LMC)
- **Glenmont Elementary Schoo**l (Built 1957) 11 classrooms and a hallway
- **Hamagrael Elementary School** (Built 1954) 15 classrooms, cafeteria/gym
- Slingerlands Elementary School (Built 1940) 6 classrooms, cafeteria and kitchen
- BCMS (Built 1932) Three art classrooms, "pit" area renovations, relocation of a music room
- BCHS (Built 1952) Technology classrooms, a large art room. and a Family & Consumer Science (FACS) room. Also, auto shop, wood shop, kiln room and photo lab repairs.
- **Eagle Elementary School** (Built 2008) No classroom renovations needed.

The last significant changes to the elementary classrooms took place between the 1950s and 1970s. A detailed list of all school projects can be found on pages 6-7.

To vote, you must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen and a BCSD resident for at least 30 days prior to the vote. Absentee and early voting ballots will be available from the District Clerk.

Elementary attendance zones could change in 2026-27

To address disparity in enrollment at the elementary schools, the Board of Education will consider changes to elementary attendance zone boundaries. Recent enrollment trends have resulted in steep declines in student enrollment at Elsmere. Hamagrael and Slingerlands, while Eagle and Glenmont are at or near capacity. To alleviate overcrowding at Glenmont and Eagle, and maintain smaller K-5 class sizes, a committee

of stakeholders — including administrators, teachers, and parents - has been working with a consultant, Tyler Technologies, to review enrollment data and neighbrhood maps. The consultant is expected to present proposed boundary changes to the Board in December or January. Stay up-to-date by visiting bethlehemschools.org or scan the QR code.
